Got a self-published book? Win a prize! The Writer's Digest Self-Published Book Award competition has an early-bird deadline of April 1, 2025. Categories include literary fiction, genre fiction, nonfiction, self-help, memoir, and children's literature. Also see the Writer's Digest Annual Writing Competition (early-bird deadline: May 5, 2025). Writers can submit in several categories including inspirational/spiritual, memoir/personal essay, nonfiction essay or article, genre short story, literary short story, poetry, humor, and children's/young adult fiction.
